1945

The Chamber stresses the shortage of labor in Waukesha County and urges issuance of building permits for the construction of housing on a temporary basis

1951

The Chamber sponsors a retail sales clinic for up to 700 business owners to learn best practices in sales and human relations

The Association clears its financial debt under a new board of directors, sells the nonprofitable credit bureau and begins a new decade with a new goal in mind: To make Waukesha a better place to live and work


